	suffered repeated mortar, minenwerfer and
	rifle-grenade attacks and was badly wounded
	in his left shoulder. He was taken to a field
	ambulance, then on to a casualty clearing station, but died at 5pm on the 20th.
Age at death:	21
Military info:	Arthur enlisted in The Gordon Highlanders, a famous old Scottish regiment, a
	month after war broke out. He was 19 years old, 5ft 9ins tall, with blue eyes
	and fair hair. He was posted to the 10th Battalion, a Kitchener unit being
	raised in Aberdeen. They were part of 44th Brigade in the 15th (Scottish)
	Division. The battalion first trained at Aldershot and in November moved to Midhurst, West Sussex. In March 1915 they went to Chisledon, Wilts and
	the following month Arthur was promoted to lance-corporal. In May the
	battalion arrive at Tidworth near Salisbury Plain for their final exercises. On
	9th July 1915 Arthur and the 10th Gordons landed in France at Boulogne.
	Within a fortnight Arthur came down with rheumatic fever and spent a month
	in hospital at Rouen. He was discharged on 12th September. On the 25th the
	10th Gordons went into action at the Battle of Loos, suffering 489 casualties,
	though it is not know if Arthur had rejoined his unit by then. In April 1916 the
	battalion were involved in the German gas attacks near Hulluch, and in May
	they suffered heavy losses at the defence of the Kink position. That month the
	Battalion merged with the 8th Gordons, and became the 8/10th Gordons. On
	19th June Arthur was injured at Hulluch during an enemy mortar and aerial
	torpedo barrage and he succumbed to his wounds the following day.
Grave/memorial:	Arthur is buried at Bethune Cemetery in France and is also commemorated at
	St Petroc's Church, Padstow and on Padstow War Memorial.
Family info:	Father: Arthur George Cross, born Ipswich, Suffolk in 1865. Mariner. He
	served in the war as a transport officer in the Black Sea Force. <u>Mother:</u>
	Emily Champion Bastard, born Padstow, Cornwall in 1866. Daughter of
	notable Padstonian Captain William Bastard. The couple married in 1893.
	Arthur was their only child. The family moved to Troon in South Ayrshire.
