Age at death:	silhouetted against a dying sun, were easy prey. All 1,600 British sailors died. 25
Naval info:	Butcher boy Alfred joined the Royal Garrison Artillery in Padstow aged 14.
	Two years later he changed tack and on 4th May 1906 he became a Boy
	Seaman in the Royal Navy. On 30th November 1907, his 18th birthday, he
	signed on as an Ordinary Signaller. Alfred must have been bright for such a
	role, as reliability and speed were crucial. He would have been situated near
	the ship's bridge. In 1912 Alfred married Bessie Campbell, aged 18, a servant
	girl from Plymton in Devon. They had a son, whom they also called Alfred. In
	March 1913 Alfred was made Yeoman Signalman. When war came he was
	posted to Monmouth, an obsolete cruiser based at Plymouth. Three Coastguard
	reservists from Padstow were also aboard as well as a serving seaman from his
	home town. All sailed south to join the 4th Cruiser Squadron in their hunt for two fast
	German raiders, <i>Scharnhorst</i> and <i>Gneisenau</i> . On 1st November they sighted the enemy
	off the Chilean coast at Coronel and gave battle. But the British stood no chance and
	Alfred, from the bridge, would have quickly realised they were outgunned and doomed. <i>Monmouth</i> and the ageing <i>Good Hope</i> were sunk with all hands - Britain's first naval
	defeat in a century. Just a month later the navy destroyed both enemy raiders at the
	Falklands. All 2,200 Germans, including Admiral Von Spee and two sons, died.
Grave/memorial:	Alfred's body was never found. He is commemorated on Plymouth Naval
	Memorial, at St Petroc's Church, Padstow and on Padstow War Memorial.
Family info:	<u>Father:</u> Joseph Williams, born Padstow in 1857. Domestic gardener. <u>Mother:</u>
v	Amelia Higgins, born St Eval, Cornwall in 1860. They married in 1881.
Additional info:	Alfred's only son died in WW2 when his destroyer <i>Matabele</i> was torpedoed
	whilst on Arctic Convoy duty. His name is also on Padstow War Memorial.
