	on the Western Front he was dead. Thomas
	was fatally wounded as he and his countrymen
	beat off a German attack at Lagnicourt during the Battle of Arras in April 1917.
Age at death:	24
Military info:	The outbreak of war was greeted with wild enthusiasm in Australia and in
	November 1914 the first 20,000 Diggers sailed off to fight. Thomas, aged 23,
	joined the army in August 1916. He was 5ft 6ins tall, weighed 10 stone and
	lived with his widowed mother in Queenstown in Tasmania, an island state
	off the Australian coast. Thomas sailed on 30th September that year, arriving in
	England on 21st November. He was posted to the experienced 12 <sup>th</sup> Battalion,
	part of 3rd Brigade in the 1st Australian Division, and landed in France on 22rd December, Thomas reached his unit at Elers in January 1017. He was
	22nd December. Thomas reached his unit at Flers in January 1917. He was
	hospitalized soon afterwards, but rejoined his battalion at Dernancourt on the 3rd March. Despite the bloodletting at Verdun and the Somme in 1916, the
	allies planned new offensives for Spring 1917. The British would attack first
	at Arras, drawing the enemy, before the French stormed the Chemin des Dames
	ridge to the south. But plans were disrupted in February when Germans withdrew
	to the Hindenburg Line. Despite this the attack went ahead at Arras on 9th April.
	But the advance left the Australian Lagnicourt sector thinly held and the Germans
	struck on the 15th. The outnumbered Diggers won - but young Thomas fell dying.
Grave/memorial:	Thomas is buried as Grevillers British Cemetery, and is listed on the Australian
Grave/memorial.	Roll of Honour, at St Petroc's Church, Padstow and on Padstow War Memorial.
Family info:	Father: Thomas Lovering Oldham, born Padstow, Cornwall in 1859. He wed
T anny mit.	Elizabeth Burgess in 1885, but she died two years later and Thomas started a new
	life in Australia. <u>Mother:</u> Evelyn Phillips, born Tasmania in 1865. She wed Thomas
	in 1890 and one of her three children was Thomas Francis Oldham. Thomas Senior
	died at Lyell, Tasmania in 1906. Two years later Evelyn married a William Hooper.
Additional info:	There are two Thomas Oldhams on Padstow War Memorial - TF Oldham is the
	Australian cousin of Padstonian TL Oldham. Their Cornish fathers were brothers.
